

From our Director of Religious Education: It is easy to allow ourselves to feel powerless in the

Howdy Church Folks,

"The prophetic liberal church is the church in which all members share the common responsibility to foresee the consequences of human behavior (both individual and institutional), with the intention of making history in place of being merely pushed around by it".

—James Luther Adams, "Taking Time Seriously," in *The Prophethood of All Believers*

Let's talk about POWER! Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. defined power as the ability to create change. He championed the idea that within each of us is a well of untapped power and potential to be a force for good. We all can change things—change a point of view, change an attitude, change a life. A smile is powerful in the fact that it's contagious, but how do we tap into that power, and why should we?

Our principles invite us to embrace the power within us. If we have the goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all then surely we are compelled to take the steps toward meeting that goal. The UUA endorses many projects of social justice. Be it, our "Standing on the Side of Love Campaign", "Standards for Ethical Eating", or "Reproductive Justice Initiatives", our denomination encourages us to take action on the things we are passionate about. One of the most unique things about being a UU is the emphasis placed on the work that we do as human beings. As a denomination without a creed endorsed endgame, the here and now becomes incredibly important. It's incumbent upon us to take the action to make here and now better.

Action, however, can be where we as Unitarian Universalist start to misconstrue the notion of power.

It is easy to allow ourselves to feel powerless in the face over whelming odds or violent hate, but if power is the ability to create change, then like worth and dignity it is inherent in each of us. We only need to take a small step to tap into our own power. We only need to act.

These small actions can be the change the world needs: talking to a manager at Publix about paying a penny extra per pound, signing a petition to a congressman, telling someone their bigoted language makes you uncomfortable, or being there to listen to a friend. These are POWERFUL acts that we are all capable of. If we make the choice to act, to be aware of the power we all possess, then surly our congregation and denomination at large will make the journey toward the goal of world community, and maybe even achieve it.

Joys and Concerns has been a real "hot button" issue among UU churches! This topic has also been an issue of intense discussion within the worship committee for years at BBUUC. I would like to see it be, at this time, a catalyst of growth and understanding in our community.

There are SO many opinions about Joys and Concerns that run the gamut...from members, lay leaders, professional ministers and worship theorists – even visitors and guests! One particular aspect that has received a range of positive and negative opinions is the open joys and concerns format that we practice at BBUUC. Joys and Concerns are handled throughout our UU congregations in many unique ways today – some a result of necessity, some as an evolution of worship arts in each community.

Currently, our Worship Committee is responding to some valid concerns in revgard to our format from input we have received from our own members, denominational leadership, professional ministers and worship associates. They have not only heard from those who don't want to change a thing about it, but are also clearly reviewing input from others who think it's time to make a change, or at least consider a change. In other words, the Worship Committee is taking a comprehensive approach to Joys and Concerns.

As congregations grow, changing worship elements and traditions are often a necessity, and often linked to time. Imagine our format of Joys and Concerns in a congregation of 200 or even 300! It makes it difficult to plan a service with the other elements, honoring the time for the speaker, musicians, and congregants as well as those in the RE program. It's difficult to plan a worship service to fit within an hour's time when you have no idea how long the Joys and Concerns may take on any given Sunday. Aside from that, at BBUUC, TIME (though it IS a consideration) IS NOT the driving force behind contemplation of change. The driving force is more the vulnerability we deal with from week to week when we create an "open mike" situation during our Sunday Service.

We have attempted to define this portion of our service by asking that the sharing be kept to "personal" issues – no announcements, no political commentary, and to keep the sharing brief. This request is not always honored. We can continue to request additional restrictions, but then we're creating a laundry list of exceptions, which can be very subjective and actually begins to let the air out of the whole spirit of the practice. And we can all come to an agreement on how we will "do" J&C – but that doesn't take in to account newcomers, visitors or guests who may not be familiar with our agreement.

Personally, I love Joys and Concerns - and I am willing to forgive a few transgressions to receive the good things it can do for our community. But then, I must admit, when one of those inappropriate instances occurs, I am left feeling less than worshipful. Others have shared different opinions. Some find J&C offputting and a bit exclusive, sometimes inappropriate. Some don't like worship as a public forum for individual and personal issues. Some don't mind sharing a limited number and type of J&C's, but they don't like the randomness of what we might get from week to week. It's worth discussion and hearing all the various sides...trying different approaches... keeping calm and rational dialogue on a topic that has strong emotional responses for many. This is what the Worship Committee is attempting to do.

I hope that we can all stay in covenant with one another during this process, and be open to consideration of various points of view. In the end, consensus may be unachievable, but certainly the democratic process is important. The Worship Committee will want your feedback, and I'm sure there will be more discussion. Perhaps even a town hall meeting will be called after the trial of alternatives in October.

There have been many recent articles posted throughout the UU web and blogs. We have had spirited commentary on our own yahoogroups list. If you *really* want to delve into the Joys and Concerns issue – there are other articles and resources available, which I will give you some links to below.

From the Desk of the Treasurer

Orderly conduct of financial affairs is the responsibility of the board, treasurer, and finance committee. In order to have the trust of donors, it is critical that the church's finances be transparent and that spending be in accord with deliberate and shared intentions. The Treasurer, in conjunction with the Finance Committee and the Board, is beginning to make changes in processes and procedures within the church, with the goal of making the church's practices more sound and consistent with good business standards. The current treasurer, being retired and with grown children, has more time to spend on some of the details than have past treasurers. Some of the changes that may affect you to some extent are:

- Changes in the form for requesting reimbursement of an individual's expenses on behalf of the church;
- Employee timesheets for all employees;
- Changes and additions to the various fund classes that are used to segregate funding of particular activities;
- Changes in check issuance;
- Some changes in policies and procedures for finance and accounting related issues;
- Some suggested changes in church by-laws for the next year;
- Various initiatives to make the financial status and activities of the church to its members;
- New accounting and financial reporting software;
- Changes in financial reporting; and
- Changes in budgeting in order to have more coordination of church priorities and fund-raising.

Most of these changes will not be apparent to you unless you are a Board or a Finance Committee member. If any of these changes cause any problems, please bring them to my attention. When there are changes, there are sometimes unanticipated problems, which I will address.

She has spoken around the world and been a consultant with international consumer groups. She moved to St. Augustine, Florida, in 1996 to care for her aging parents.
