

The Artists' Corner: Lori Pierce Exhibit

For the month of October, The Artists' Corner is pleased to present rubbings by artist, Lori Pierce.

"These gravestone rubbings were taken in the cemeteries of New England about 50 years ago (back when it was still legal) as part of ongoing research collaborations and conversations between artists and historians coming out of the Fogg Museum at Harvard. They date from the beginning of the 1600's to the Revolution. I was excited by them because they are the earliest examples of western sculpture done in this country. We worked in a radius from Boston that would get us home in time to cook dinner. I have fond memories of my daughter making dolls out of leaves and twigs while I experimented with sea weed emulsions and rice paper on ancient stone."

The Artists' Corner is located across the lobby from the entrance and features a different exhibitor each month. Please stop by and enjoy this interesting and fun work!

From Your Director of RELIGIOUS EDUCATION



Excitement was in the air Sept. 18 as many of our BBUUC kids moved into new classes. Kids now "too old" for nursery care practiced how to "be" in Spirit Play, kids new to the Elementary Class got to add their voices to the creation of their own covenant, and kids new to middle school joined in making the longest ever list of hot topics to discuss in the Teen Class. For all the normal concerns that they or their parents may have had about these changes, the kids trusted us all when we told them they were ready for this step. Teachers were there with smiling faces and helping hands, and another one of life's many transitions was made. It won't take long for them to feel like they've been a part of their new group forever.

And only days later, our first adult LRE class of the year began, led by Unitarian Universalist minister Jack Ford. "Faith Like a River" had sixteen attendees that first Wednesday night as the group began finding out how the UU past has - and is - affecting the UU present. If you wanted to come, but couldn't make the first session, there's still room for you and it won't take long for you to feel like a part of that group either. The classes are designed so that you can attend whenever it's possible for you, so know that the welcome mat is always out. "Faith Like a River" will always meet on Wednesdays, but not EVERY Wednesday, so watch the church calendar. Here are all the dates if you'd like to add them to your personal calendar. Sept. 21 & 28, Oct.12, 19, 26, Nov. 9, 16, &, 30.

This year our adult and children/youth classes are connected in ways that they haven't always been. "Faith Like a River" introduces adults to some of the same historical figures and themes that our Spirit Play kids will encounter in their story baskets. "Holidays and Holy Days", this year's curriculum for the Elementary kids focuses on the celebrations in many of the world's religions. It's linked to an adult version of "Holidays and Holy Days" which will be offered once a quarter around the themes of Changing Seasons, New Year/Forgiveness/Resolutions, Salvation/Freedom, and Birth Days, themes and celebrations shared by so many world religions. The first one of those will be Tuesday, Oct. 18. The Teen Class will be learning about and trying out different spiritual practices all year. One of those is Tai Chi which they'll practice during RE in October followed. The same class will then be offered for adults after the service from 12-1.

With the adult LRE classes, childcare will always be available for those who need it. All that's asked is that you sign up in advance so we can plan adequately. You may do that by emailing me (<u>bthomaspatterson@yahoo.com</u>) or signing up by the Sunday before the class on the Childcare Reservation Sheet on the table in the foyer. It's going to be a great year!

Roots and Wings by Karen Christiansen

My Roots:

My immigrant great-grandparents were from Ireland, Scotland, and Germany., and my grandparents taught me about flowers, picking apples and about coping and love. My roots also include a Catholic father and Lutheran mother whose love merged and who survived their parents disapproval of divergent religious merging. My Mom taught me to "follow the rules" and Dad taught me to ignore the rules. My relatives include 7 brothers and sisters on Mom's side, and 14 from Dad's side, multiplying in many aunts and uncles and cousins.

I had the experience of a free childhood, in a neighborhood where parents let us (my two brothers included) play baseball and roam the Minnesota Mining Company colored sand lot, the "tar hill," and the stream beyond unsupervised. My childhood friends were so different that I learned the beauty of differences and knew that no matter what one believed we were all ok.

My education took place in parochial grade school, public high school, libraries, and colleges. It resulted in a BA, Masters of Education and time spent in Meadville-Lombard Seminary after retirement.

My Wings:

I spent every summer between ages 14 and 20 at a Wisconsin Lake, working for a family or a camp on a lake. I joined a Lutheran Prince of Peace Volunteers group where I spent two years in Chicago's "inner city," near the Robert Taylor Homes learning about poverty, resilience, protecting one another, and bonding.. I met my husband, Ken, in POPV and dared to marry him. (43 years so far!). We had two children, John and Chris, whose marriages (to Melanie and Beth) provided more women in the family and precious grandchildren.(Jillian, Connie, Sully, and Xavier). The family has taught me more about love and living and I'm proud of each and every one in this family.

Special Flights Taken on Wings:

I started a National Organization for Women group in a conservative Ohio town and from it and its' members we started a Battered Person's Hotline which continues today and has grown to a shelter.

I was one of the first women in Defiance, Ohio to run for city council and be elected twice! I developed a community-based public television station out of cable funds which did open viewing of council meetings (keeping newspaper honest) school board meetings and then morphed into all kinds of community affairs like high school events, sports, and parades. I taught and was taught by students in a public school for 31 years. It felt like play and was a huge joy in my life. Support by family and fellow teachers and parents made it work. Appreciated that I could be an "odd" teacher experimenting, opening the doors to enter and go out. We took on water testing, animals of all kinds, roving artists, creation of our own environment. One year was never like another. I believe in public schools for kids like myself who would never know reading otherwise nor have the option of home schooling.

I taught and was taught by students in a public school for 31 years. It felt like play and was a huge joy in my life. Support by family and fellow teachers and parents made it work. Appreciated that I could be an "odd" teacher experimenting, opening the doors. We took on water testing, animals of all kinds, roving artists, creation of our own environment. One year was never like another. I believe in public schools for kids like myself who would never know reading otherwise nor have the option of home schooling.

Seminary was an opportunity to do field work in transitional housing, bone up on UU history, current UU possibilities for developing curriculums in congregations, and experience internship in chaplaincy at the University of Chicago hospitals. I chose to leave early due to open heart surgery putting me a semester behind.

Retirement has been a rollercoaster so far, changing my plan-ahead comfort zone to spontaneous decisions. Moving to Florida and becoming a snowbird is a work in progress. Downsizing is still going on and so is adjusting to two new communities. My cats have not learned to walk down the street with me and meet the new neighbors, but perhaps the right dog will come along.

What drew me to BBUUC?

Everyone there. Being UU for decades helped. Finding two UU groups in Jacksonville helped. Mostly it was all the invitations. Come to church, won't you sing at the Christmas program with us grandma? Why not join the Diversity network? Yes, you can hold an Evensong group at the church. The people in that group sold me. So honest, so authentic, so caring. This feels like home. It's good to be home. Page 5

Getting to Know KEN CHRISTIAN-SEN



I don't know how to say much about myself without getting far too long-winded for a newsletter page. I grew up in a Christian/Lutheran context. My dad was a conservative minister, but also a very loving man. I took a lot of strength from his teaching, but also did my own thinking. The certainties I learned very early were challenged first by many conversations with peers from other backgrounds and later by reading Buddhist, Hindu and other religious writings in a college world religions class. In the immediate post-Sputnik era, hearing and sharing much speculation about life on other planets, I believed the same god that inspired Christianity would touch those lives - and they wouldn't be talking about Jesus of Nazareth because Nazareth is a place on earth. What words would they be using? What images would they see or imagine? My mind exploded. Later I taught world religions and related subjects in college.

Add to this a two-year, post-undergraduate, volunteer experience in Chicago. Prior to this volunteer experience I had no real understanding of race issues in the United States. I was deeply struck by what I experienced and observed working in the Robert Taylor Homes, the nations largest public housing project. I created the game *Dignity* to share that experience. It was published by the National Council of Churches – Friendship Press, and sold about 11,000 copies before going out of print. Race issues are still very important to me.

How did I come to BBUUC? Family. We have a loving family here and wanted to be near them. (We also have a loving family in Toledo, OH, and spend half the year near them.) This is the second Unitarian Universalist church of which I have been a member. I am very excited about the people I have met at BBUUC through the Evensong program last spring and through the worship services and other activities.

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Tribal Style Bellydance

Taught by Charlotte "Annunciata" Jones

Thursday Evenings, 7:00 p.m. October 16 – November 17 at BBUUC

"Bellydance is both a celebration of the female spirit and a physical display of the strength and beauty of women." –Carolena Nericcio

"Bellydance" is the commonly used term for an ancient dance art form originally conceived in the Middle-East. Originally regarded as a sacred dance for women, today, the dance is used as a form of celebration, artistic expression, enjoyment and body conditioning.

The class will be 6 weeks long, from October 16th to November 17th and in that time students learn and build upon a variety of movements integral to the dance. Suggested donation for the class is \$25 in advance or \$5 for drop-ins. Proceeds will be donated to the church Wish List fund.

Annunciata is certified in American Tribal Style (ATS) Bellydance with Fat Chance Bellydance of San Francisco. She is a core member of *Belili Moon*, a tribal bellydance troupe based in Northeast Florida. Since *Belili Moon* is a fusion group, they also perform tribal-based choreographies as well as traditional ATS.

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This Day in Unitarian Universalist History

11 October 1564

The anti-Trinitarian Martin Cellarius died in Basel, Switzerland, at the age of 65. Considered the first self-proclaimed Unitarian, he was imprisoned in Germany for his beliefs. Cellarius is the author of several biblical and philosophical works, and he influenced both the Polish and the Transylvanian Unitarian movements.



5 October 1655

Having determined that John Biddle was so controversial that any court decision on his case would endanger the Puritan government, Oliver Cromwell, the lord protector of England, exiled and imprisoned him on the Scilly Isles. Cromwell released Biddle 3 years later at the request of friends. Biddle is known as the "father of English Unitarianism." His Two-fold Catechism was a theological treatise on Unitarianism, comprised of A Scripture Catechism and a brief Scripture Catechism for Children.



20 October 1880

1880 Lydia Maria Child, an ardent Unitarian, feminist, and abolitionist, died at age 78. Born in Medford, Massachusetts, she joined the church served by her Unitarian minister brother, Convers Francis, in Watertown, Massachusetts. Child found success as a popular writer, producing a romantic historical novel and practical household manuals. She became vice president of the Women's Anti-Slavery Convention of New York and edited the National Slavery Standard. Later she turned to religious issues and published The Progress of Religious Ideas through Successive Ages, which contended that all religions had sacred insights. She also espoused women's suffrage and the cause of Native Americans.



25 October 1600

1600 The Diet of Léczfalva, Transylvania, used the word Unitarian as an adjective. This is the first time that the term was recorded. Since the Council of Nicea in A.D. 325, when the central issue was whether Jesus is the same as or different from God, an underground "Unitarian" movement existed until the mid-1500s, when separate churches were organized.

Samhain (pronounced sow-en) is a pagan holiday celebrating the end of the harvest season. It falls halfway between the Autumnal Equinox and the Winter Solstice, beginning at sundown on October 31. Halloween and Samhain share pagan roots. Both holidays have allusions to the veil between the earthly world and the spirit world being at its thinnest on this night, allowing those who have passed to visit with the living. Even for those of us who don't share those beliefs, this holiday can be a time to think of our friends and loved ones, telling stories and sharing remembrances. BBUUC member Otto Rafuse is a practicing Neo-Pagan Druid, and is a Senior Druid with Dark Waters Grove, Ar nDraiocht Fein (A Druid Fellowship). He will share his thoughts about Samhain, their most sacred holiday, and its influences on Halloween.
