
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UUA President the Rev. Peter Morales has released the following statement regarding the Occupy Wall Street movement:

"The Occupy Wall Street movement that has now spread to other cities across the country is a public outcry of frustration and anger. The protestors have taken to the streets to draw attention to the fact that our economic system has not only failed to protect the most vulnerable among us, it has preyed on the majority for the benefit of very few. The Occupy protests are a wake-up call that the American people are in great peril, and we have been for some time.

"It is not surprising that Americans have had to take to the streets to get the attention of our leaders. For too long, we have seen attention paid to banks that are 'too big too fail' while the plight of the poor and the working class goes unaddressed. For too long, we have been pitted against each other by those in power, by a corrupt economic system that pushed us to consume more and to 'get ours' at any cost. Now we know: The cost is too great, and is ultimately without satisfaction.

"Last Sunday, I had the opportunity to join the Occupy Boston protesters in this city's financial district. Unitarian Universalist ministers from several of our Massachusetts congregations came together to organize an evening vespers service at the Occupy Boston encampment, offering spiritual support and encouragement to the hundreds of souls gathered there.

"I was honored to bear witness to this historic event, and grateful for the chance stand side by side with Unitarian Universalist ministers showing such passionate devotion to our Fourth Principle: The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large. And I know that our ministers and congregants have played similar roles at the other Occupy events across the country.

"Unitarian Universalism embodies a long tradition of working for economic justice and workers' rights. Today is another opportunity for us to live our faith, and the Occupy protests are a first step on the road to repairing our country.

"I reach out to Unitarian Universalists everywhere to consider how you might be of service to any among us who are struggling to provide for their families, those who have been cheated and abused by financial institutions, and all those whose backs ache under a burden of debt, unemployment, and fading hope. Let the world see the power of our faith in action.

"And if these protests are truly planting the seeds of a reformation – even a revolution – may those seeds be nurtured by love. May the change come from a place of compassion and good will. And may all those involved know this: We are with you."

Beginning in January, we will re-start our **Circle Supper** program, with more details forthcoming in the December Journey. We are excited to have **Pam Edwards-Roine** as our Circle Supper Coordinator this year, and we know that this can be a great way to strengthen connections and help us really get to know each other in community. For those of you who don't know what a Circle Supper is, it's a small dinner gathering in a home setting. There can be several dinners at different homes planned during the same weekend, or on different weekends. Host homes are found...people sign up to participate and are assigned a dinner to attend...food themes or menus are planned...everyone brings a dish to share...food and fellowship follow in an intimate setting that results in deeper (here's that word again!) CONNECTIONS.

Another program that is already in place is our **Mini Mixers**. It's a special party that's held at a member's home. Limited to about 15 guests, the purpose is to get some of our newer members along with some of our longer-time members, better acquainted. The gathering includes planned activities to help us get to know every person attending. Spouses and partners of members are included. This program is coordinated by **Lynn Wadley**, who schedules these events every couple of months or so. Membership Committee members like to consider every one of our members at BBUUC a de facto part of our membership ministry! Our UUA President Peter Morales, elected in 2009, has called growth in UU congregations "a moral and religious imperative." UU congregations are surrounded by the spiritually hungry and religiously homeless, he said during his campaign, and increasing membership is "the moral equivalent of feeding the hungry and housing the homeless." In recent years, the UUA has published many articles, developed workshops and resources for what is known as "Hospitality as a spiritual practice."

"Practicing hospitality is not something we can appoint people to do, nor is it a set of techniques or behaviors we 'use' on new people. Rather, it is an individual work of intentional action, action that creates the quality of relationships in our churches that will nourish newcomers and longtime members alike. Practicing hospitality expresses our belief in the inherent worth and dignity of each person. Through our actions of hospitality we move towards creating a world in which we are all treated with justice, equality, and compassion...Welcoming people to our congregations isn't a duty; it's a way to encounter the mystery and wonder of life." ## FROM YOUR DRE

Both my husband and a good friend who teaches with me in Yulee are from Alabama. She and I have compared many "Alabama" notes over the years. This week I learned that she has told her Alabama relatives that she won't be coming back home for visits any time in the foreseeable future. You see, her husband is a native of Peru, and although he was adopted as a child and raised by Caucasian Americans in Michigan, he, of course, clearly looks Hispanic. So do their two children, and so will the baby that she's expecting in July. With the new Alabama immigration law, she doesn't feel like her all-American family will be safe in Alabama – safe from suspicion, safe from search and seizure, safe from imprisonment without due process. And she's not the only one. Hispanic people – including many who are there on perfectly legal work visas – are leaving in droves, many of them coming to Florida. When I was talking to my friend, I was reminded, also, of the student who graduated as the valedictorian at YHS about four years ago – an illegal immigrant. She, though, was born in South Africa and is white. The chance of her being picked out as an immigrant is very slim. She, like many, many children, were brought to the U.S. as a young child by parents seeking a better life; she had no choice.

These are just two among many personal stories around the country in the midst of this currently hot topic. As Unitarian Universalists, how do we react to the challenge of immigration reform? The UUA, and BBUUC is a member of the UUA, is a member of the Interfaith Immigration Coalition, a group working for immigration reform based on human dignity and worth. So what are the "UU Perspectives on Immigration"? That's what we'll be talking about on Sunday mornings, November 13tth and 20<sup>th</sup>, from 9:15-10:00 in Enrichment. I hope you'll join us and add your voice to the discussion.

Many of you have been participating in this year's adult programs and classes – the immigration class joins our UU history class "Faith Like a River", our adult Tai Chi class, and the first in our quarterly world religions class, "Holidays and Holy Days: Adult Version", all since September.
