2012 Florida District Assembly Report

The 2012 Annual Assembly of Congregations in the Florida District UUA met March 23-25 at the Unitarian Universalist Church of Jacksonville, our sister congregation on Arlington Expressway. BBUUC was represented by four delegates: Gina Norstedt, Elizabeth Teal, Debbie Atkins, and Kenneth Christiansen. It was very good to meet UU's who came from all over the state as well as several national leaders.

A major change in Florida District bylaws was passed unanimously at the Friday evening meeting. What has been an eleven member Board of Directors was replaced with a five member Board of Trustees. This change was undertaken to decrease the amount of energy put into legal maintenance activities and add energy to efforts toward faith development, youth and young adult empowerment, intentional multi-racial and multi-cultural inclusivity, and congregational health generally. Among other things, a "Council of Elders" (persons of all ages with experience and commitment) has been created to help guide our new efforts on a district-wide basis.

The above changes fit with the new regional structure and goals of the Unitarian Universalist Association. At some future date, perhaps coinciding with the startup of church activities next fall, it would be good to host a meeting with one or more of our district executives to learn how all of this structure can work for us and how we can best contribute to it.

Friday evening activities were completed with a concert by Emma's Revolution.

Saturday activities included presentations by three keynote speakers, three afternoon service projects on site at ARC of Jacksonville, Tree Hill Nature Center, and North Florida School for Special Education, a feedback session, and an evening concert by Jacksonville Musicians. In addition there were three worship services one of which, the midday worship, was led by the youth in attendance including four youth from BBUUC: Morgan Jarman, Joshua Dean, Nicholas Oliver, and Jillian Christiansen.

All of the keynote presentations dealt with congregational outreach in some way. Rev. Susan Frederick-Gray is the settled minister of the UU Congregation of Phoenix, AZ, where this year's UUA General Assembly will be held. She spoke deeply from her heart about the ministry her congregation has undertaken to stand with immigrant families adversely impacted by Arizona immigration laws. Her advice to the leaders of all congregations was to know their own story; to pick one issue that matters to them and work on it out of faith, not out of guilt; and to make everything we do part of our religious work.

Revs. Jose Ballester and Patricia Jimenez, coauthors of *Both & Neither: Being Unitarian Universalist and Latino/a*, spoke about building congregational awareness of cultural differences in ways that create more welcoming congregations. What are our customs when somebody new comes into the church? What questions do we ask? How do we present ourselves? Do we have unstated expectations that make people feel included or excluded?

Additional BBUUC attendees included Karen Christiansen, Eric and Dani Slader, C.J. Griggs, Chris Jarman, Joyce Johnson, Jeremy and Sarah Ritzmann. Overall our delegation felt that the 2012 Florida District Assembly was a very worthwhile event.

Buckman Bridge Unitarian Universalist Church Chosen to be an Anchor Congregation

To all,

As chair of the Anchor Congregation & Young Adults Task Force, I am proud to announce that on April 17th our congregation was one of only two congregations this year, nationwide, to be honored by the UUA for our ongoing dedication to developing and supporting Young Adults and Campus Ministry (YA/CM), and have been awarded "Anchor Congregation" status!

We are one of only two congregations in our entire district ever to have been awarded this designation by the UUA. Many of you are curious what this means to our congregation and what it brings to our church.

Anchor Congregation status means:

We are being recognized for our efforts, and have been designated by the UUA as a congregation that both is willing to help congregations and also have the experience and knowledge to help other congregations start and/or grow their YA/CM groups.

We will be given space on the UUA website.

This space will include our Congregations name, and will provide contact information for those congregations that are looking for assistance in starting and/or growing their congregations YA/CM groups and initiatives.

We have access to several grants and scholarships that are <u>only</u> available to Anchor Congregations. We will be recognized on the floor of Justice General Assembly this year in Phoenix, where we will be publicly recognized for our efforts and awarded our framed certificate to hang in the church.

Most importantly, we will have the opportunity to work directly with the UUA and The Office of Youth and Young Adults to help re-envision the Anchor Congregation program, to extend its scope to ensure it is supporting the growth of Young Adults/ Campus Ministry effectively.

Being awarded this status is much more than just a plaque to hang on our wall. Becoming an anchor Congregation means we have been recognized for standing out from the crowd, for being a guiding light with-in our community and beyond! Lying before us is an opportunity to directly impact our faith and help shape part of its future.

I am, as I am sure you are, excited to see what the future may bring, and to have an opportunity to see our shared light help to shape the future of our faith in such a direct way!

May 6-27, 2012 Buckman Bridge Unitarian Universalist Church Spring Food Drive to Benefit

The first Sunday in May begins our annual food drive. The food drive has been conducted by Religious Education for about nine years. Over these years the Second Harvest Food Bank has been able to streamline the process of gathering food donations for distribution. For every \$1 they receive they can provide enough food for 7 meals. More and more, the people Second Harvest serves are working families who have lost income. Despite these families' best efforts they simply cannot make ends meet from paycheck to paycheck. The chances are very high that you've met someone who is hungry-the young man working at the carwash, the person stocking shelves at the grocery store or the senior sitting next to you. Second Harvest's role has evolved from one of emergency relief to being a main source of food for thousands of families every day. This year at Buckman Bridge Unitarian Universalist Church you will see collection barrels in our sanctuary in which to place tangible donations. Why would we have barrels when Second Harvest can do so much with a dollar? Let me explain...In the children's religious education classes, they

learn about our faith and our principles. It is important that they have tangible, real, and contextual connections to why and how we can help others. Children tend to readily relate to other children who are hurting or have a need. Our children are taught that all people have inherent worth and dignity and through the food drive and the many other social actions projects conducted by our congregation, our children learn to support and uphold this principle.

So, how do you donate?

For the **general congregation**, we are asking for monetary donations. If you can, please write a **check to Second Harvest Food Bank** and place in the collection plate on any Sunday in May.

For **Parents of children in the Religious Education program**-we will be sending home a box for the kids to collect food items. When shopping, we encourage you to talk about favorite foods and foods that will be the best to donate to hungry children. Let your kids pick items from the list provided and have them bring their boxes back to church by May 27th. Children and Youth can be encouraged to ask neighbors and friends for donations. Making this a hands-on social action project with the kids, nurtures their compassionate spirits and their Unitarian Universalist identities.

After all...

FROM YOUR DRE

After ten years, I now have only two more DRE columns to write for The Journey. I'll miss this form of conversing with you. It's been a good discipline for me, a teacher of writing, to experience. As UU's our Sunday speakers enjoy the "freedom of the pulpit", the freedom to speak from their conscience, not from any proscribed topics or viewpoints. I've enjoyed the same freedom through this column, and I'm grateful for that.

Many times when I've had a chance to speak in a service or some other occasion, I refer to us and to our kids as being links in a human chain that was forged before our births. We have benefitted from

those who come before and hopefully do our part to keep that chain intact and strong. So in these last two columns, I want to talk about some specific Unitarian Universalists that have special meaning for me for a variety of reasons.

Samuel J. May (1797-1871). Samuel May, born in Boston and related to well-known families in colonial Massachusetts, spent 1845-1868 as minister of the Unitarian Church of the Messiah in Syracuse, NY (since renamed for him). He was known as a pacifist (until the Civil War), a great supporter of public education for all (girls and blacks included), a supporter of women's rights, and an active abolitionist, openly participating in the Underground Railroad and welcoming freed slaves as members in his church (breaking the Fugitive Slave Law repeatedly), even insisting they sit up front rejecting any segregation of them to the back. As one of many life-long efforts to support public education, he and his Unitarian church raised funds to help send a young family friend, Chloe Merrick, (a Methodist, not Unitarian family) to the south to teach the children of freed slaves and create an orphanage for them. Not to just anywhere in the south – to Fernandina Beach. A few years later, continuing to receive support from May's church for her work, Merrick met and married Harrison Reed. Reed was been born in MA, moved to WI where he was an early owner and editor of the Milwaukee Sentinel newspaper, and finally ended up in Florida after Lincoln appointed him Tax Commissioner. Chloe encouraged her husband to establish a multiracial political and educational system in Tallahassee and he did. At the end of his term, the Reeds moved to Jacksonville where Harrison edited a local magazine. His last public service was representing Duval County in Florida's House of Representatives until his death in 1899. He and Chloe are buried in Jacksonville.

I learned about Samuel J. May in a personal way. Born and raised 20 miles from Tallahassee, I knew nothing about Merrick, Reed, or May. In 1979, my husband was hired by the (combined) *Milwaukee Journal--Sentinel's* telecommunications subsidiary and we moved, living there for 23 years. When our daughter Ariel left WI for college in Boston in 2001, John and I decided to move to the Jacksonville area. In 2002 we moved to Yulee and I began teaching in Fernandina as well as serving as DRE at Buckman Bridge. After a summer working at the Amelia Island Museum, Ariel decided to write her history honors thesis on Fernandina during the Civil War. It was she who introduced us to Merrick, Reed, and May. What an amazing, convoluted path of connections as I finally learned about a man who has become one of my personal heroes!

Tony Larsen (1949-). The Rev. Dr. Tony Larsen was born in San Francisco, studied to

be a Catholic priest for ten years, then became a UU minister in 1975. He has been the minister at the Olympia Brown Unitarian Universalist Church in Racine, WI ever since. Tony was the first openly gay minister in our denomination. As a nationally respected UU minister, he was asked to carry the UU banner at the World Parliament of Religions in Chicago in 1993. There he combined his love of music and his commitment to his faith tradition when he sang "Spirit of Life" to that assembly as an invocation – creating an opportunity that many attendees took to find out more about Unitarian Universalism. Tony goes together with music, love of humanity, humor, deep knowledge, firm commitment to justice, and an honest voice. You'll hear that voice when you read the chapter he wrote about religious education in the outstanding UU book of voices, "Salted with Fire" or his other publications. During my years in WI, I had many UU occasions to work with him and experience his unique energy and enthusiasm. I'm sure he doesn't remember me, but no matter. From him I learned that I wasn't the only one who believes in UU evangelism, who sees our faith as something that matters in the world and can matter even more. He has no idea that he's one of my heroes, but he is. Whenever I think of Tony, I can't help but smile. I'll close this with the words he uses to end each Sunday service, simple words which speak to his understanding of Unitarian Universalism and the work we have before us in the world.
