



UU JUSTICE FLORIDA

Unitarian Universalist Justice Florida is one of 21 UU state advocacy networks that combine the power of congregational and individual commitments to work for systemic change to problems at the local, state and national levels.

Vision

Our vision is a just and compassionate society, an improved global economy, and a sustainable earth, starting in Florida

Mission

Our mission is to promote justice, equity and compassion in public policy, guided by our faith tradition and working with public interest groups and interfaith partners who work for the common good.

What we do: UU Justice Florida provides education and training about our core issues, state and federal legislative processes, and opportunities for civic engagement. We host conferences on key issues of the day, develop leaders, and mobilize UUs to call and meet with their legislators, hold forums, write letters to the editor, attend rallies, attend meetings of their city council and county commission, register voters and encourage all to participate in our democracy. We build coalitions with Florida Unitarian Universalist Clusters; regional and national networks, UUA affiliated organizations, interfaith partners and secular public interest organizations.

Legislative Day: Each spring, UU Justice Florida sponsors "UUJF Legislative Day" and brings Unitarian Universalists from all over the state to Tallahassee to learn about the legislative process and bring UU values to the Florida Statehouse. Training is provided by members of the League of Women Voters. People of all ages are encouraged to attend. Financial support is offered. Carpooling makes the event doable and fun. Interfaith partners are welcome. Join us! Together we can make a difference!

Annual Meeting: April 26, 2014 UU Justice Florida held our first Annual Meeting and workshop at the Florida District Assembly. 27 Unitarian Universalists from 11 UU congregations in Florida voted to establish our three core issues for 2014-2015: **Climate Change, Immigration, and Democracy at Risk.** We plan to hold our annual meeting each year in conjunction with a statewide assembly so people from as many congregations as possible can participate.

Our Current Issues

Climate Change

Perhaps the most important issue for the future of our planet. Working with interfaith and secular organizations, the UU Service Committee and UU Ministry for Earth, UUJF in partnership with the Florida Council of Churches is planning the first Florida Statewide Interfaith Climate Conference, scheduled for March 6-7 at the First United Methodist Church in Orlando. Climate change needs many voices to speak out about allocation of funding, legislation, and policy at all levels of government. The Commit2respond program will encourage all to participate. UUJF invites Unitarian Universalist members and friends statewide to attend this major interfaith event. Planning for the future, discussing carbon numbers, addressing our fresh water issues, as well as sea level rise and saltwater intrusion on the coasts, needs our attention and commitment. Bridging spirituality, healing and action is the focus of the conference.

Immigration

Immigration reform is also at the front of the national dialogue. Dreamers demand our attention. Immigrants of all ages deserve worth and dignity and a path to citizenship, so all can live without fear and keep their families together. The 2013 Statement of Conscience of the Unitarian Universalist Association says it well: "A belief in 'the inherent worth and dignity of every person' is core to Unitarian Universalism: every person, no exceptions. It's time for comprehensive immigration reform.

Democracy at Risk

This is perhaps the most complex and far-reaching issue. There are basic concerns about voters' rights, voter intimidation, voting machine integrity, gerrymandering, and the gutting of the Voting Rights Act in the *Shelby* decision of the Supreme Court. There are concerns about the impact on elections from massive amounts of money from corporations and wealthy individuals, made possible by the Supreme Court decisions in *Citizens United*, and *McCutcheon*.

Other factors putting democracy at risk:

- 1) Escalating inequality in so many areas of life: economic injustice, mass incarceration, migrant justice, sexual and gender injustice.
- 2) Privatization of prisons, which means that the prison business profits from keeping their cells filled and taking people off the streets—disproportionately people of color. The school-to-prison pipeline means young people are incarcerated for minor crimes, then have their voting rights removed. When ex-felon voting rights are not restored, another block of voters is taken off the rolls. We need to Stand on the Side of Love with all oppressed people in this society, and fight for justice for all.
- 3) Gun safety issues. If 90% of voters want reasonable gun safety laws such as background checks, but Congress doesn't respond, is that because they are being "rated" by the NRA? Isn't the influence of lobbyists on our legislators putting democracy at risk?
- 4) Dis-information in the media: When voters are overwhelmed with messaging on TV, radio, newspapers, and all media outlets from special interest groups, big moneyed interests, and trans-national corporations, many are disgusted and don't vote. It is up to all of us help educate people about the issues, help register voters, and encourage them to vote. Check www.uufunding.org for special grants to congregations for registering voters.
- 5) Health Care: If Congress continues bickering over health care reform, it is selfishly putting millions of Americans at risk for medical and financial disaster. Too many members of Congress are being lobbied by the pharmaceutical companies and too many physicians are also being compensated by them. Isn't it a risk for democracy if the health and well-being of our people are in jeopardy because of such influence on our legislators?

Special 2015 Project

UU Justice Florida is "taking the show on the road" collaborating with Florida UU Clusters to present three Social Justice Empowerment workshops: January 31 at the West Central Cluster in St. Petersburg; March 21 at the Northeast Cluster in Orlando; and May 2 at the Southeast Cluster in North Palm Beach. Each workshop will be unique to that Cluster, but include empowerment training applicable to all, and information on the UUA program www.commit2respond.org. 

UUMFE - Growing a Movement

UUMFE volunteers celebrated the 25 year anniversary of the organization in 2014. And it all sprang from a conversation in a pizza restaurant in New Haven, CT. Our pioneers were exploring how to make the Seventh Principle more central to our faith.



From that conversation was born the Seventh Principle Project and the first edition of the Green Sanctuary program was published two years later. After incorporating as an independent non-profit organization, UUMFE produced three more editions of the program that leads us through religious celebration, education, administration and community action. The first congregations were certified as Green Sanctuaries in

2002 and today, over 240 congregations have gone through the program to certification.

To round out the resources that UUMFE volunteers were developing to support congregations in the Green Sanctuary program, UUMFE also formed a partnership with Northwest Earth Institute (nwei.org) to promote their discussion-format courses in voluntary simplicity, sustainable communities, peace, food issues and more.

In 2008, UUMFE gifted the Green Sanctuary program to the UUA, which is continuing to manage and expand the program. UUMFE is still engaged by providing volunteer advisors, coaches and resources to congregations that are in the process of completing certification requirements or even going through recertification.

Back in 2003, the Seventh Principle Project started advocating for greener conference practices at our General Assemblies and hired a meeting consultant to help define what UUs would need to do to plan a green Assembly. Since 2005, the Assemblies have gotten ever more careful about our footprint in host cities and along the way have been trail-blazers at several convention centers, with the added impact of encouraging new recycling businesses in several of the cities. Today, the GA planning staff is recognized as experts in green

meeting results and have national awards to show for the work. And the UUA still contracts with the same consultant that UUMFE hired in 2003.

Meanwhile, after much reflection, the organization changed the name to UU Ministry for Earth and began working in earnest to pass a UU Statement of Conscience on the Threat of Global Warming. UUMFE Board Chair Claudia Kern convened a panel of scientists and justice experts, and together they were able to craft amendment language for what became at the time the strongest statement on Climate Change published by any denomination in the United States. We will never forget the 2006 General Assembly when the final Statement passed with a sea of yellow voting cards firmly held high. But, as Van Jones reminded us in his Ware Lecture at a later GA, we had to get ready to govern. (Link to SOC from uuministryforearth.org.)



To support congregations as we all began to live out the Statement of Conscience, UUMFE began publishing Earth Day materials in 2008, including original worship and action resources and vetted links to online materials provided by other organizations. UUMFE has continued providing these materials annually on diverse topics such as ethical eating, immigration, water, resilient communities, climate adaptation planning, biodiversity, waste and consumption, socially responsible investing, and shifting to a low carbon future. All are available on the UUMFE website today.

With the inspired leadership of Rev. Katherine Jesch, our minister on staff from 2002-2008, UUMFE began exploring how to grow Environmental Justice awareness and action by UUs. To ground the call to UUs, UUMFE published the Green Papers, which chronicled the roots and growth of EJ activism in the United States. At that time, UUMFE was recommending that we broaden the name of our work to Earth Justice. As you have heard, the organization is now using the term ecological justice to encompass our work. (Link to Green Papers at uuministryforearth.org.)

2009 was the first year that UUMFE partnered with 350.org and over 100 congregations answered the call to participate in the International Day of Climate Change that year. We have answered the call from 350.org every year since, including counting over 1,500 UUs in the People's Climate March in New York City last September, the largest attendance of any faith group that day. Obviously, that took much partnering and networking among UUs to get that many folks to show up for the March. But, that is getting ahead of the history.

In 2012, with support from the UU Funding Program and individual donors, UUMFE published a new curriculum named *Our Place in the Web of Life, An Introduction to Environmental Justice*. This is a

highly participatory series of 5 workshops to help us explore our UU values and the impacts of choices we make. In a few minutes, we are going to adapt one of the exercises using brown paper and colored markers - one of the most useful tools that the curriculum designers provide for us to learn about our communities and plan our projects.


In 2013, UUMFE introduced the idea of Environmental Justice tours to the General Assembly in Louisville. Much of Louisville outside the downtown and the Kentucky Derby complex is struggling with many decades of industrial and chemical degradation. With UU leaders and GA participants we embarked on a tour that you will not see in the Chamber of Commerce brochure, giving much poignancy to Wendell Barry's words at the Public Witness a few days later: His poem 'Questionnaire' begins with the first of 5 hard questions, "How much poison are you willing to eat for the success of the free market and global trade? Please name your preferred poisons."

As you may have noticed, many of our UU gatherings are often devoid of active Young Adults. In 2012, UUMFE received a grant from the Cedar Tree Foundation to begin building a network of UU Young Adults for Climate Justice. We found that this age group understands well that climate change will have impact on their lives - and probably more intensely every year. UUMFE pays a Young Adult to coordinate this network which now numbers over 300 across the United States and Canada. Look for more and more local and

regional programming as the network works to become more self-governing and reaches out to concerned Young Adults.

So, we worked with individual congregations, pushed for changes at the General Assembly, partnered with a few UU organizations - especially UUSC around water issues - and begun a Young Adult network. But . . . we were not seeing transformative change within our denomination and the climate justice issues were really hitting the news.

UUMFE began to work on the idea of growing movement. With more grant monies, we convened an EJ summit in Detroit in March 2014. The attendees represented UUA departments and leaders of other UU related organizations who were willing to work on a broader vision of ecological justice for our denomination. We took EJ Tours, met with the legendary activist Grace Lee Boggs, worshiped together, and ended the 3-day summit with a 25-point work plan. We called the summit an EJ Collaboratory and the name has stuck. Two actions of note are that the group developed the concept of a book of essays by UU leaders about EJ, and Skinner House has agreed to publish the book in 2015. A second action had more impact than we even dared hope. Together we crafted a letter with a call to action that we sent to over 100 UU leaders and administrators in June 2014. With the inspired leadership of Brock Leach from Sarasota who works with UUSC, the idea of a national UU campaign to address climate justice was born at General Assembly, just a few weeks after the EJ Collaboratory call to action.



So here we are in the midst of forming a movement. At least that is how it feels to me. Exciting times - scary new responsibilities - innumerable exhausting teleconferences - growing hope. All from a conversation in a Pizza Parlor that grew from the dedication of over 40 volunteer board members, 4 part-time staff and consultant positions and many other volunteer resource developers, testers and advisors.

Principles of Environmental Justice

Delegates to the First National People of Color Environmental Leadership Summit held on October 24-27, 1991, in Washington DC, drafted and adopted 17 principles of Environmental Justice. Since then, *The Principles* have served as a defining document for the growing grassroots movement for environmental justice.

PREAMBLE

WE, THE PEOPLE OF COLOR, gathered together at this multinational People of Color Environmental Leadership Summit, to begin to build a national and international movement of all peoples of color to fight the destruction and taking of our lands and communities, do hereby re-establish our spiritual interdependence to the sacredness of our Mother Earth; to respect and celebrate each of our cultures, languages and beliefs about the natural world and our roles in healing ourselves; to ensure environmental justice; to promote economic alternatives which would contribute to the development of environmentally safe livelihoods; and, to secure our political, economic and cultural liberation that has been denied for over 500 years of colonization and oppression, resulting in the poisoning of our communities and land and the genocide of our peoples, do affirm and adopt these Principles of Environmental Justice:

- 1) **Environmental Justice** affirms the sacredness of Mother Earth, ecological unity and the interdependence of all species, and the right to be free from ecological destruction.
- 2) **Environmental Justice** demands that public policy be based on mutual respect and justice for all peoples, free from any form of discrimination or bias.
- 3) **Environmental Justice** mandates the right to ethical, balanced and responsible uses of land and renewable resources in the interest of a sustainable planet for humans and other living things.
- 4) **Environmental Justice** calls for universal protection from nuclear testing, extraction, production and disposal of toxic/hazardous wastes and poisons and nuclear testing that threaten the fundamental right to clean air, land, water, and food.
- 5) **Environmental Justice** affirms the fundamental right to political, economic, cultural and environmental self-determination of all peoples.

6) **Environmental Justice** demands the cessation of the production of all toxins, hazardous wastes, and radioactive materials, and that all past and current producers be held strictly accountable to the people for detoxification and the containment at the point of production.

7) **Environmental Justice** demands the right to participate as equal partners at every level of decision-making, including needs assessment, planning, implementation, enforcement and evaluation.

8) **Environmental Justice** affirms the right of all workers to a safe and healthy work environment without being forced to choose between an unsafe livelihood and unemployment. It also affirms the right of those who work at home to be free from environmental hazards.

9) **Environmental Justice** protects the right of victims of environmental injustice to receive full compensation and reparations for damages as well as quality health care.

10) **Environmental Justice** considers governmental acts of environmental injustice a violation of international law, the Universal Declaration On Human Rights, and the United Nations Convention on Genocide.

11) **Environmental Justice** must recognize a special legal and natural relationship of Native Peoples to the U.S. government through treaties, agreements, compacts, and covenants affirming sovereignty and self-determination.

12) **Environmental Justice** affirms the need for urban and rural ecological policies to clean up and rebuild our cities and rural areas in balance with nature, honoring the cultural integrity of all our communities, and provided fair access for all to the full range of resources.

13) **Environmental Justice** calls for the strict enforcement of principles of informed consent, and a halt to the testing of experimental reproductive and medical procedures and vaccinations on people of color.

14) **Environmental Justice** opposes the destructive operations of multi-national corporations.

15) **Environmental Justice** opposes military occupation, repression and exploitation of lands, peoples and cultures, and other life forms.

16) **Environmental Justice** calls for the education of present and future generations which emphasizes social and environmental issues, based on our experience and an appreciation of our diverse cultural perspectives.

17) **Environmental Justice** requires that we, as individuals, make personal and consumer choices to consume as little of Mother Earth's resources and to produce as little waste as possible; and make the conscious decision to challenge and reprioritize our lifestyles to ensure the health of the natural world for present and future generations.
