

Web Based Programs Used for BBUUS Adult, Kids Summer Curricula

One of the resources available to BBUUS from the Unitarian Universalist Association is curricula to use with all ages in BBUUS' Lifespan Religious Education program. In the past that has meant purchasing some great curricula from the UUA Bookstore, but the UUA has now begun to produce curricula that can be downloaded free from their web site. These new programs, some still in the testing phase, are part of the "Tapestry of Faith" program and will be used in all BBUUS Lifespan Religious Education classes this summer. "Tapestry of Faith" is described by the UUA as follows:

Tapestry of Faith is a new series of programs and resources for all ages that nurture Unitarian Universalist identity, spiritual growth, a transforming faith, and vital communities of justice and love. These resources are being developed out of a broad series of conversations that articulated a future direction for Unitarian Universalist religious growth and learning and denomination-wide focus groups which helped shape a program that would offer a variety of resources—downloadable, printed, viewable, interactive, and more—a religious growth and learning program for the twenty-first century.

The Primary Class will use the "Creating Home" curricula. "In these sessions, children explore the deep sense of sacredness, the beauty of hospitality, and the gift of loving relationships that a home can represent." (UUA) The Elementary Class will use the "Toolbox of Faith" curricula. "What tools does Unitarian Universalism offer for the challenges of life? Children discover what aspects of UU faith are helpful to them, developing a toolbox of faith." (UUA)

One important feature of both of these curricula is called "Taking It Home". It's a section of the daily lesson that's available for parents to read online to see what happened in class that day and then to be able to build upon the lesson at home.

This is how it works. Note the session # that's being taught that Sunday. It will be printed in the Sunday order of service and will be posted online to the BBUUS yahoogroups site. People looking for info on the *(continued on page 2)*

Primary Class, go to http://uua.org/religiouseducation/curricula/tapestry-faith/creatinghome/index.shtml and select the session # from the Table of Contents, then select "Taking it Home" from the "Session Plan". For info on the Elementary Class, go to http://uua.org/religiouseducation/curricula/tapestryfaith/toolboxfaith/index.shtml and follow the same procedure. It's easy!

Sunday morning Enrichment classes from 9-10 will use the "Spirit in Practice" curriculum. This program was developed based on three ideas as noted by the UUA: first, that "the 'free and responsible search for truth and meaning' that we affirm in our Unitarian Universalist principles is a spiritual quest; second, that this search is more effectively and more evocatively carried out if we have some training and discipline – not to mention some practice, in both senses of the word – that helps us pay attention to the sacred; and third, that there is nothing in our lives that cannot serve as a tool for this work." There will be a variety of facilitators over the summer and this class, like all Enrichment classes, is designed as stand-alone class sessions – there's no "all summer-long" expectation, just an open door.

NOTE: EACH CLASS WAS SET UP FOR 16 LESSONS. WE ONLY HAVE 14 SUNDAYS TO COVER, SO EACH CLASS SKIPS TWO SESSION NUMBERS.

FROM YOUR Director of Religious Education

BBUUS kids, parents, and members of the congregation join me in thanking this year's Religious Education teachers who have shown their commitment to our children all year and will continue through the summer. The Primary and Elementary classes each have a team of four wonderful teachers.

Annabelle Gallois chairs the Lifespan Religious Education committee and is in her second vear teaching the Primary Class. She has led the social action activities for all of the classes which resulted in thousands of pounds of food donated in the food drive and hundreds of dollars raised for the UU Service Committee. Annabelle is also a fabulous photographer who chronicles the congregational life of BBUUS, especially the kids, through her pictures. Joann Carolla is one of those rare people who jumped right into teaching in LRE back in 2006-07, even though she was a new member at the time. When she teaches in the Primary Class, she often supplements the lesson with books and activities she knows the kids will like, and finds other ways to do the extras that are needed in throughout LRE. Joani Maskell, the third member of the Primary Class team, has been teaching for more years than I even know, and her expertise with the children shows. Can you imagine keeping 4-6 year-olds focused on the lesson when you have to teach outside because all the space inside is being used by the other class' giant project? Ariel Patterson is the newcomer to the group, but a life-long UU who remembers what her LRE classes were like

and brings that experience to her teaching. She not only taught the Primary Class, but also the Stage 1 Transitions Class, and even pinch-hitted with the teens.

Marilyn Smart was the chair of LRE when I began serving as your DRE six years ago, and she has continued to teach the Elementary Class ever since. In addition to teaching, Marilyn also shares her professional musical skills with us and helps with any of our musical needs, especially with the Kids' Choir. Since 2005, Jen Glassman has taught in either the Primary or Elementary Class where she is equally skilled. She brings her experience in working with Girl Scouts with her to the classroom and this year's Elementary Class curriculum benefitted from her medical knowledge as well. David Murphy began teaching the Elementary Class this year and has added the much-needed male perspective to the 10-girls. 3-boys Elementary Class. His ease with the children helped keep things on track in a curriculum that can be chaotic, and his skills came in very handy in the midst of creating a barnyard full of animals for the Christmas service Dani Atran Slader, the fourth member of this team, is a product of this congregation, having attended throughout her teens and been an active member during her college years. She brings a grounding in Unitarian Universalism, vast experience in working with children through the YMCA, and training in education with her on Sunday mornings.

Deborah Cillo and I worked with the teens this year as we

focused on racism in classroom discussions. She has a solid base of social action involvement and a wonderfully direct way with teenagers – a group that many view as intimidating. Deborah came away from Sunday discussions so impressed with our teens, and they responded equally well to her.

One other person who we all want to thank is **Peter Grogan**, a new member who, as a member of the RE Committee, has helped us have fun together at BBUUS. From carving pumpkins to flying balsa airplanes, Peter has come up with the ideas and made things happen. He has added a wonderful dimension to our time together at BBUUS.

And, finally, I'd like to thank you, the members of this congregation for your ever-strong, everconstant support of the Lifespan Religious Education program at this church, and my role in that program. Your kind words and helpfulness throughout the year, your presence at services conducted by our children, your participation in adult Enrichment classes, your making the effort to get your children to church, and your financial support of this program as part of the life of this congregation are actions that speak to the true commitment you feel. OUR WHOLE LIVES: Sexuality Education

After much discussion, training, and planning, BBUUS is pleased to offer the renowned Our Whole Lives (OWL) sexuality class for UU children who will be in the 6th-9th grades as of the 2008-09 school year! The class will be led by two of our specially trained facilitators, Pat Ray and Karen Walsh, each of whom is certified to teach this class.

Although OWL has been developed for almost all ages, this age group is of particular focus because of the physical and emotional development that occur during this period. The OWL class requires strong commitment of time and energy from facilitators, parents, and children, and I can tell you as an educator, a parent, and a UU professional that it's worth making that commitment.

The proposed class schedule is to meet every other Wednesday evening at church from 6-8 PM for six months from the first week in August through the end of March. The commitment must be made by parents and children to attend all sessions with the understanding that after missing two sessions the child will no longer be a member of the class. It's also essential that both genders be well-represented in the class, so if a child drops out it could theoretically end the class for everyone since the size of our group is small to begin with. We are inviting children from UU-Church of Jacksonville to participate with our BBUUS kids and hopefully that will both strengthen our numbers and allow for some extended contact between the kids of both congregatons.

The first step in holding the class is for ALL parents to attend an orientation session where you will learn the answers to your questions about the course. Many of our congregation (including our facilitators) will be attending General Assembly in late June, so we have tentatively scheduled the parent orientation for Wednesday, July 17 from 6-8 pm. Although I will not be facilitating the class, I will be making the arrangements and handling the scheduling. Once the class begins, any questions that arise from the class itself should go directly to Karen and Pat.

At this point, what is needed is for you to contact me if you want your child to participate. Many of you have spoken to me in the past in casual conversation, at the Parents' Group meeting, etc. Please do not assume that I know your child will participate from those conversations. Instead, please email me (bthomaspatterson@yahoo.com) to let me know that your child/ren will be participating (don't tell me at church - I'm often going in different directions and might forget). It would be very helpful if you could let me know ASAP.

Our denomination worked long and hard, along with the United Church of Christ, to produce OWL. It has a national reputation as being an outstanding program. In fact, a friend's local Episcopal church is planning to have members trained in Atlanta this summer to teach OWL classes to their children. We are very fortunate that BBUUS - years ago - paid for the training and materials to make this availabale to families in our congregation, and especially fortunate to have people in our congregation not only trained to lead the classes, but willing to commit the time and energy it requires. Thanks, Pat and Karen!

So, with everything in place except the kids, it's your turn :) I hope to hear from you soon.

















UUA TRUSTEE TIDBITS

The month of June is upon us, when we, the Florida District, are afforded the opportunity and responsibility of hosting our Unitarian Universalist Association of Congregations (UUA) General Assembly (GA) in Ft. Lauderdale, June 25-29. I look forward to being with you this year, especially because I was not able to attend the District Annual Meeting in April. For those of you have been to a GA you know what an exhilarating and wonderful experience it is. For the first-timers you will find much to do and learn during our UU days together. This month I am writing about something I touched upon in the lengthy report which can be found on the District website, written after I returned from the April UUA Board of Trustees meeting: a new DVD, "Listening to Experience", produced by the District Services Staff Growth Team.

This recently-completed DVD captures the wisdom and experience of twelve ministers from some of the fastest growing UU congregations in our nation who gathered for three days in November 2007 to talk about how to increase the number of Unitarian Universalists in the world. Five thousand copies have been produced, and are being distributed, along with a letter from Rev. Bill Sinkford, UUA President, to UU ministers, seminarians, theological school professors and instructors, and hundreds of key lay and professional leaders throughout the Association. During the conversation among these ministers, they responded to questions posed by the Rev. Alice Mann of the Alban Institute which included:

- What is the saving message of your congregation?
- How does your congregation help people move inward and outward on their spiritual journey, and how does this relate to congregational growth?
- What institutional, organizational, and practical nuts and bolts need to exist in order for a congregation go grow and keep growing?
- What are the obstacles or roadblocks to growth?

This is an excellent DVD for ministers and lay leaders to watch together over several meetings and benefit from the wisdom of these ministers. A list of questions to discuss, the same ones that served as the basis for the conversation in November, is included in the packaging, as are the names of the participating ministers.

Dear Mystified, Wild? I gather you do not mean wildness such as the woods around Walden Pond. So you must be using a 21st century expression meaning that it is out of your hands. If that is so, I can certainly understand your concern and confusion.

First, keep in mind that not everything is out of your hands. Even if all actions are not in your control, your response always is. So, first decide what to do based on right action. Those wonderful principles that you and other members of your congregation and denomination use as your guiding light would seem to be a good start. Maybe there is one particular principle that speaks to you more than the others. If not, may I suggest that you consider principle number three: the acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations. I spent much of my life in the company of such notables as Ralph Waldo Emerson, Louisa May Alcott and Bronson Alcott; they each supported me in my own spiritual growth. These wonderful Unitarian thinkers each encouraged me to do what I believed was right.

So, how does that apply to this money that government is sending on to you and your fellow and sister citizens? Well, besides the right action of meeting any debts that you have accumulated, maybe a contribution to that new building you and your congregation are planning would be an excellent start. It would provide a place, a special place in the woods, for everyone to foster that acceptance and encouragement to spiritual growth: your own "Walden Pond", if you will. And, right now, as I understand it, your special contribution would get extra "bang for the buck"* since it would be matched dollar-for-dollar by

someone in your congregation who must truly believe in that community encouragement.

Henry David Thoreau (July 12, 1817 - May 6, 1862), Henry David Thoreau was an American author, philosopher, and naturalist who was part of the Transcendentalist movement. He is best known for his "Civil Disobedience" essay, which he wrote after spending a night in jail for not paying the poll tax; and for his two-year retreat to Walden Pond, detailed in his second book, Walden, or Life in the Woods. Thoreau was a nonjoiner, as were many who identified in his time as Unitarian in theology. But he identified with Transcendentalism, a movement that grew as a rebellious Unitarianism, and he considered himself Unitarian.

"I learned this, at least, by my experiment; that if one advances confidently in the direction of his dreams, and endeavors to live the life which he has imagined, he will meet with a success unexpected in common hours."
