About our Service:

The Flower Ceremony, sometimes referred to as Flower Communion or Flower Festival, is an annual ritual that celebrates beauty, human uniqueness, diversity, and community.

Originally created in 1923 by Unitarian minister Norbert Capek of Prague, Czechoslovakia, the Flower Ceremony was introduced to the United States by Rev. Maya Capek, Norbert's widow.

In this ceremony, everyone in the congregation brings a flower. Each person places a flower on the altar or in a shared vase. The congregation and minister bless the flowers, and they're redistributed. Each person brings home a different flower than the one they brought.

And don't forget the best part of our Easter / Flower Communion service — the Easter Egg Hunt conducted right after the service, followed by a delicious potluck.

April 23 Service: Dr. Mark Yount "A Question of Balance"

About our Service:

Is global warming the fever symptom of a planet overrun by virulent progress? About our Speaker:

Since joining BBUUC in 1997, Dr. Mark Yount has given over 100 sermons, chaired committees, served on the Board, and served as Youth Adviser. Mark taught philosophy at Trinity College (Hartford), St. Joseph's (Philadelphia), and Jacksonville University. He has degrees in Philosophy from William and Mary (BA), Villanova (MA), and the University of Colorado at Boulder (Ph.D.). Mark works with Mental Health America of NE FL, helping homeless/ at-risk people apply for disability benefits.

Rev. Laurie will examine our innate unconscious biases, how they help shape how we interpret Deity, and what they mean for our daily life. Learn to recognize unconscious bias. About our Speaker:

Rev. Laurie Denman is the 3rd Degree High Priestess and Temple Keeper for the Chosen Path Church, a full Temple of the Correllian Nativist Church. She is an attuned Reiki Master and instructor as well as a Correllian Shaman. She is a charter member of the Northeast Florida Pagan Leadership Coalition. She is a Project Manager for a major world bank with two grown children who are still the center of her Universe. She volunteers in several employee networks at the bank including the LGBT Allies, CFO Diversity and Inclusion Council and LEAD. She volunteers for Pug Rescue of Florida fostering dogs and serves on the Board of Directors as Treasurer. She is the CFO and Membership Volunteer for Correllian Education Ministries, the seminary of the Correllian Nativist Church, commonly known as Witchschool.com. She is an active participant as a Faith Leader in the Jacksonville Coalition for Equality's efforts to update the Duval County Human Rights Ordinance to include protections for our LGBTQ citizens. Her hobbies are water gardening, playing World of Warcraft and spending time with her pugs, her cat, and her pet tortoise.

Treasurer's Corner

Congregational Growth and Development Fund

In my nearly four years as treasurer, I have observed that our congregation gives most willingly when working towards some goal. Whether the goal is a building or a minister, our congregants are energized by the prospect of positive changes for our church community.

With that perspective in mind, the Board has included a new fund for the coming fiscal year. This fund will be called the Congregational Growth and Development Fund. The church will be putting aside at least \$1,500 per month into this fund. The purpose of the fund is to accumulate the monies needed for some significant future need—a minister, a fellowship hall, or some other currently unidentified item—so that the funds will be there when the church elects to go forward. The reason that the Board has not named a specific need at this time is that the congregation's wishes in the future may not be the same as what the congregation wants right now. If the church collects money for a specific purpose, the church cannot spend it for a different purpose.

I am hopeful about the future of our church. Things looked very grim a year ago, but we have recovered and prospered since then. We are planning on a bright future, and one critical element in giving us a bright future is having the money we need. I think the creation of the Congregational Growth and Development Fund is a positive, first step in advancing towards that bright future.

I am hopeful that this is my legacy, and I am hopeful that in this time of Spring and renewal, that each of us gave what we could toward that legacy.

So I share an offering from another church in the area – a Methodist one. I am always reminded that we have more in common than we have different.

So, come,

you who have much faith and you who have little, you who have been here often and you who have not been for a very long time, you who have tried to follow and you who have failed. So, come.

May Buckman Bridge Unitarian Universalist Church continue to be the place where you come. May it be your legacy.

Last week the wonderful Meg Kaminski asked me if I would do the story for all ages for the service. She

sent me a lovely piece about seeds as a metaphor for hope, and the message of it is lingering in my head.

If you missed the service on the 19th the theme of the story was that all great actions initial-

ly start off as someone's hope, but, just as seeds need soil, water, and light to grow, so too does hope need care, work, and actions to come to fruition. So often we hear phrases like, "I hope it will get better," or "hope for the best," but these are empty phrases unless accompanied by a plan of action. It's not enough to have a dream—one has to work for it.

I think this idea is rattling around in my brain because so much of what I see is injustice; things that have me gritting my teeth and telling myself it can't last forever. But the truth is that they might. If I and my fellow justice seekers fail to take action, nothing will ever change. Noticing that there is a problem is not enough. It is an empty gesture to worry about the vulnerable if we are not willing to fight for their needs.

Ours is a denomination where faith is put into action, and that makes me proud. I hope our church lives up to what we hope for.
