About our Service:

Sometimes it is just hard to sit with whatever you are feeling or experiencing while we have a tendency to be so reactive to change. I'm currently working with the idea that our feelings move our thoughts and then our thoughts spring into action, in the





face of "impermanence". If we could learn to sit with what is happening to us for just a moment and not be overly attracted or overly repulsed, we may find that we have a better chance to be a part of our own intentional changes.

About our Speaker:

Billy has a BA degree from Stetson University, an MA from The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, and post graduate hours in counseling from the University of North Florida. He is an Academic Counselor at Florida State College at Jacksonville and the Director of the Karma Kagyu Study Group.

About our Service:

Genesis Chapter 6, Verse 13 tells us that "God said unto Noah, The end of all flesh is come before me; for the earth is filled with violence through them; and, behold, I will destroy them with the earth." Of what kind of violence was God speakiing? What could be worthy of the destruction of human beings on the earth? Those who read the narrative of Noah and the Flood as a children's story

and those who read it casually, all too often miss the point! Let's together read this episode, its prologue and epilogue, a little more carefully and truly understand the message of this classical tale.

About our Speaker:

Rabbi Merrill Shapiro, the President of the St. Augustine Jewish Historical Society studied Electrical Engineering at Cornell University and New Jersey Institute of Technology, Jewish Studies and Education at the Jewish Theological Seminary of America and The Ohio State University and served as a Graduate Research Assistant at Melton Research Centre for Jewish Education in the Diaspora at Hebrew University in Jerusalem. He has also been a Yad Vashem Scholar at Israel's Holocaust Memorial in Jerusalem. He was an Instructor of Jewish History at the University of Central Florida and a frequent Road Scholar and currently an OLLI Educator at the University of North Florida.. Shapiro served congregations in Columbus, Ohio, Orlando, Florida and Richmond, Virginia. Shapiro is the Immediate Past National President of Americans United for Separation of Church and State. He and his wife Robyn live in Palm Coast, Florida and have two daughters and five grandchildren.

PRESIDENT'S PEN

The Difficult Questions

Our second source reads: Words and deeds of prophetic women and men which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love.



If you are unfamiliar with Unitarian Universalist Reverend James Joseph Reeb, I strongly encourage you to engage in some very much needed research. In his short time on this Earth, Reverend Reeb affected the lives of many with his passion and dedication to racial justice. Reverend Reeb died on March 11, 1965, at University Hospital in Birmingham, Alabama. The Reverend had arrived in Selma, Alabama, two days earlier on March 9, 2017, in response to Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s call to people of all faiths to support the marchers that were attempting to walk from Selma to Montgomery. That evening, Reverend Reeb and his African American companions were attacked after they became lost and ventured in to an all-white neighborhood. They were viciously attacked with clubs by a group of white men. The head injuries sustained by Reverend Reeb proved fatal. He died while answering the call of justice.

So, you may ask why I am sharing this anecdote with you. I feel that the most appropriate answer to this question is to use the powerfully prophetic words of Reverend Reeb. When completing his application for ministerial fellowship he wrote the following, "I want to participate in the continuous creation of a vision that will inspire our people to noble and courageous living. I want to share actively in the adventure of trying to forge the spiritual ties that will bind mankind together in brotherhood and peace." When I first came across this quote, I could not help but interpret this as: I need to consciously work to ensure others have the basic worth, dignity, and respect that I have the luxury of expecting to receive.

A common exercise that I assign to couples that come to me for counseling is as follows: Step 1: Identify five attributes/values that you believe is important for your partner to possess. Step 2: For each item listed, share an instance where you have demonstrated these attributes/values that you believe is important for your partner to possess. I must note that I began utilizing this exercise after my exposure to the teachings of Reverend Reeb.

I find that many people are more than happy to comply with the first step of this exercise. Unfortunately, many people thoroughly enjoy finding faults and deficits in others' actions. As for the second step, people hesitate or simply refuse to follow through on completing it. The issue that most people find in completing the second step is that they do not actually express the very thing that they expect from others. So, how does this apply to our Unitarian Universalist faith? Simple. You cannot expect a person to treat you with compassion, patience, grace, or understanding if you are not exhibiting those attributes to others.

I encourage all who read this to not only engage in this activity, but also apply it to your faith and spirituality. Step 1: Identify five attributes/values that you believe is important for your church to have. Step 2: For each item listed, share an instance where you have demonstrated these attributes/values that you believe is important for your church to possess. You can even take it a step further... Step 1: Identify five attributes/values that you believe is important for the Unitarian Universalist faith to have. Step 2: For each item listed, share an instance where you have demonstrated these attributes/values that you believe is important for your faith to possess.

With this exercise, you can identify not only what you want, what you need, or what you believe that you deserve. You also can identify what you can do to enact change in your relationships. What will you consciously work on to ensure others have the basic worth, dignity, and respect that you have the luxury of expecting to receive? It's time to answer the difficult questions.

Tickets will be on sale after Church during October. Adults \$10 and Children \$5


Wine, beer and soda will be available for donations.

Vision Task Force: October 1 from 12-2

The Vision Task Force will meet Sunday, October 1 from noon to 2 p.m. All persons are welcome to attend. Members may offer comments and suggestions at the beginning of the meeting. Future meetings will be held on the first Sunday of the month. The task force was set up to develop a process to get congregation-wide input on BBUUC's vision, and to make recommendations to the Board based on that input.

ICARE Justice Ministry



BBUUC is one of 38 religious congregations (Christian, Jewish, Muslim, Bhai, and Unitarian Universalist) that participate with Jacksonville's Interfaith Coalition for Action,

Reconciliation and Empowerment, AKA ICARE. Representing over 30,000 church members, ICARE works with very specific justice issues identified by persons who attend House Meetings which are held each fall in all of the ICARE congregations. BBUUC's ICARE Team Leaders are: Carole Hawkins, Viqui Hilliard, Corinne Warren, Karen Christiansen, and Ken Christiansen.

ICARE House Meetings are a time for small groups of congregation members to share deeply with each other. The same two questions are being addressed in all 38 ICARE congregations across Jacksonville: When have institutions let you down? What do you worry about (close to home, not just national or international happenings)? Citywide actions are planned based on input from house meetings. Additionally, we at BBUUC can address concerns we share.

Saturday, Sept. 30, 10-noon is an excellent time to attend a House Meeting at BBUUC. We will hold multiple meetings based on RSVP signup. There may be a few spaces left for a House Meeting in a home Friday 7-9 PM, Sept. 29. An October House Meeting will be scheduled if needed. To RSVP or ask questions, respond to social_action@bbuuc.org. Include your best phone number for a return call.

With the current very forceful and positive emphasis on racial justice in the Unitarian Universalist Association, the outreach of ICARE is central to the mission of BBUUC. More than half of the ICARE congregations are in the Northwest quadrant of Jacksonville. All of the work researching issues and ways to solve problems is done on an integrated, long term basis.

Issues currently addressed citywide by ICARE include Restorative Justice for Youthful Offenders instead of arrests and loss of civil opportunities; Wealth Building in Northwest Jacksonville through worker-owned cooperatives; reducing Homelessness in Jacksonville by supporting a Day Resource Center; and increasing opportunities for felons who have served their sentences by strengthening the Jacksonville Re-Entry Center.
