BBUUC's Vision For the Future We're almost there!

Last month BBUUC members turned in 103 Vision Surveys telling us their wishes for the future of our church. That's a 70 percent response rate! Your participation has made it possible to confidently understand what our church's next steps ought to be. Thanks so much!

The Vision Task Force held a Town Hall meeting in February, where we presented the survey results and heard feedback from the congregation. All of this will be incorporated into a final report, along with recommended next steps, and delivered to the Board in March.

Haven't heard the results from the Vision Survey yet? Here are the top findings:

- 1. Community amid Diversity Our biggest value proposition as a church is our strong sense of community and our acceptance of one another's differences. Over 75 percent of respondents said this is why they come to BBUUC and what would be missing if our church didn't exist.
- 2. **Invest More in Worship** While members counted the variety and quality of our services as strengths, they also ranked Worship as the top area they'd like to grow, by a margin of two to one over any other mission. Members especially want more sermons delivered by religious professionals and more spirituality included in Worship. Members ranked Faith Development and Social Witness as other areas for investment. They also want to see BBUUC better publicized.
- 3. **Does BBUUC need a minister?** Yes. By a margin of 19 percentage points members say they want a minister. Top reasons are to provide leadership, to offer chaplain services and to enhance the spiritual

side of church. Long-time members favor a minister 65 to 35 percent. Those opposed to a minister want to maintain the variety of services and BBUUC's inclusive culture. There also was concern BBUUC isn't ready for a minister.

Our objective is 100% participation in submitting your pledge cards so our Finance team can then re-evaluate the final budget for Board approval. We come remarkably close to pledge commitment every year; it's just a matter of knowing that commitment at the beginning of the year to finalize the budget.

MEMBER NEWS

We welcome Molly Brady to BBUUC

New Member Molly Brady defines herself as a mother, grandmother and great grandmother. Many of us might add "a package of energy and enthusiasm!" A person really needs to spend



time chatting with Molly to get more than a little idea of her life and activities.

Politically Molly was highly involved in the civil rights and anti-war movements. She was proudly investigated by the FBI for activism in the Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), worked for Bobby Kennedy's campaign until he was assassinated, was gassed marching alongside Dick Gregory at the 1968 Democratic Convention in Chicago, and was arrested on election day 1968.

The active Girl Scout she had been as a child chose a career in the National Park Service, and Bureau of Land Management, eventually managing 3.5 million acres of public land. (She also had a law enforcement staff and a fire station under her supervision.) For a time she attended meetings at the White House and had some input in proposed legislation and speeches. And much later, after 34 years of federal service, she was back in Girl Scouts as a troop leader for her Brownie granddaughter, and once again selling cookies!

When her daughter was a teenager, Molly became deeply involved with helping runaway children, taking many into her home, often under court direction. She estimates that she had 50 children and young adults in her home for some length of time over a 3-year period.

Of course her family took much love, time, and energy through the years as well. At various times she was a single mom, a caregiver for her mother as she suffered with early onset Alzheimer's, an advocate for many with Alzheimer's Disease and a grandmother deeply involved with the family of her daughter.

Fast forward (past work, marriage, widowhood, a battle with breast cancer and much more) to 2015 and 2017 when her great granddaughter and great grandson were born. Molly is a primary caregiver for her youngest grandson and her two great-grandchildren. She declares: "This is the best job of my life."

Then she adds "The future is full of opportunity and I look forward to a lot of it unfolding in the context of BBUUC. Love you all." And we're so glad to have you with us, Molly!



ICARE

(Interfaith Coalition for Action, Reconciliation & Empowerment)



ICARE picks issues that are important, controversial, and winnable, based on the input received in House Meetings in all 38 ICARE congregations in the fall. This past year about

85% of the congregations had one or more significant issues raised in the area of Crime And Policing. These ranged from members of ICARE congregations losing relatives to unnecessary police violence to profiling and the apparent use of different standards of policing in white and black neighborhoods.

These issues raise questions that have often been seen as controversial, particularly in white middle and upper class communities such as ours where police are generally experienced as protective and helpful.

To explain the "losing relatives to unnecessary police violence" statement further, one ICARE congregation member called police to help calm down her ex-husband who suffered from PTSD. They calmed him down alright — with a choke hold that killed him. Another ICARE Network Member lost her brother at a gas station when non-uniformed officers in an unmarked car mistook him for someone else they were looking for. As her brother left the station, the officers shot and killed him.

At the other end of the spectrum, profiling can be seen in the 8 minute documentary video filmed in Jacksonville recently: Walking While Black (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=lJFqvRwOiis).

So how does ICARE approach these issues? During the past two months, the ICARE Crime And Policing Research Committee has met with Internal Affairs, the Professional Standards Division, and the Professional Oversight Unit of the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office; States Attorney Melissa Nelson; the Department of Corrections; the Public Defender; the JSO Strategic Planner and the Commission On Progress; the national VERA Institute (https://www.vera.org/); and several Jacksonville citizens groups that are concerned with these issues.

ICARE Research Committee members, including several from BBUUC, are now contemplating what solutions steps can and should be proposed to improve the current situation of Crime and Policing in Jacksonville. Plan on attending the Nehemiah Assembly on April 23 where ICARE and public officials will meet. If you wish to become more involved before then, contact ICARE@bbuuc.org.
