Topic Exploration

Our newly adopted Unitarian Universalist (UU) Shared Values call us to action: to <u>actively</u> protect our Earth, to dismantle racism and all forms of oppression and to build and sustain fully accessible and inclusive communities. However, living by our values—both our UU principles and personal convictions—often requires sacrifice.

Change is difficult. Whether in personal life, within institutions, or across society, doing the right thing often comes with a cost. History reminds us that change-makers—abolitionists, civil rights leaders, environmentalists, and whistleblowers—have faced rejection, loss, and even danger. On a smaller scale, our everyday choices can also require sacrifice: financial, social, or personal.

At times, living ethically means losing convenience, paying more, or stepping away from spaces that don't align with our values. Yet, the cost of inaction can be far greater. The question we each must ask ourselves is: "What are we willing to risk for the sake of doing what is right? And how do we weigh that against the cost of inaction?"

Discussion: Three Simple Sacrifices to "Do What's Right" Right Now – Why might these be difficult for some?

- 1. **Boycott Facebook** Protest Meta's choice to stop fact-checking and its political contributions. The cost? Losing easy connection with friends, family, and communities.
- Boycott Amazon & Prime Challenge unfair labor practices and corporate monopolization. The cost? Giving up fast deliveries, vast product selections, and Prime entertainment.
- 3. **Shop Local & Buy Ethical** Support small businesses and eco-friendly products. The cost? Potentially higher prices, fewer options, and less convenience.

Questions / Sharing

- 1. Can you think of a time in your own life when you had to struggle or sacrifice something in order to stand up for what you believed in? What happened, and how did you feel about it afterward?
- 2. Is there something you believe is the "right thing" to do but hesitate because the sacrifice feels too great?
- 3. Why do people resist change, even when they acknowledge that it is necessary?
- 4. What historical or contemporary figures do you admire for their willingness to sacrifice for what is right? What can we learn from them?
- 5. How do we balance the need for change with the personal cost that often comes with it? Is there a limit to what one should sacrifice?
- 6. What are some ways we can support each other in times when doing the right thing is difficult?
